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VIRASORO CONSTRAINTS AND HURWITZ NUMBERS THROUGH ASYMPTOTIC ANALYSIS

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We present a new method, using asymptotic analysis, to obtain a system of recursion relations for integrals on moduli spaces of curves. By applying the asymptotic analysis on the join-cut relation of the ELSV formula, we derive the recursion relation of R. Dijkgraaf and E. and H. Verlinde, which is exactly the Virasoro constraints for topological gravity. This gives an alternative proof of Witten’s Conjecture using asymptotic analysis.

1. Introduction

We present an alternate proof of Witten’s Conjecture [1991] which claims that the tautological intersections on the moduli space of stable curves $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}$ is governed by KdV hierarchy. M. Kontsevich [1992] first proved the conjecture by constructing combinatorial model for the intersection theory of $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}$ and interpreting the trivalent graph summation by a Feynman diagram expansion for a new matrix integral. A. Okounkov and R. Pandharipande [2001] and M. Mirzakhani [2007a; 2007b] (see also [Mulase and Safnuk 2006]) gave different approaches through the enumeration of branched coverings of \mathbb{P}^1 and the Weil–Petersson volume, respectively.

More recently, M. Kazarian and S. Lando [2005] obtained an algebro-geometric proof by using the ELSV formula to relate the intersection indices of ψ -classes to Hurwitz numbers.

Here we take an approach using asymptotic analysis applied on the join-cut relation satisfied by Hurwitz numbers. The starting point is the ELSV formula which relates the Hurwitz numbers with linear Hodge integrals

$$H_{g,\mu} = \frac{r!}{|\text{Aut } \mu|} \left(\prod_{i=1}^{l(\mu)} \frac{\mu_i^{\mu_i}}{\mu_i!} \right) \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,l(\mu)}} \frac{\Lambda_g^\vee(1)}{\prod_{i=1}^{l(\mu)} (1 - \mu_i \psi_i)}$$

where $r = 2g - 2 + l(\mu) + |\mu|$ and μ is a partition with length $l(\mu)$ and size $|\mu| = \sum_{i=1}^{l(\mu)} \mu_i$. Here $\psi_i = c_1(\mathcal{L}_i)$ where \mathcal{L}_i is the cotangent line bundle of i -th marked point over $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,l(\mu)}$ and $\Lambda_g^\vee(1) = 1 - \lambda_1 + \cdots + (-1)^g \lambda_g$ is the total Chern

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character of dual Hodge bundle over $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,l(\mu)}$. We develop *asymptotic analysis* on a combinatorial expression involving mapping degrees as given by partition μ . Applying the asymptotic analysis on the join-cut relation of ELSV formula yields a system of relations between linear Hodge integrals. It recursively expresses each linear Hodge integral by lower-dimensional ones. We show that the first nontrivial relation of the system is the following recursion relation for the correlation functions of topological gravity [Dijkgraaf 1992]:

$$\begin{aligned} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_n \prod_{k \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_g &= \sum_{k \in S} (2k + 1) \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_{n+k-1} \prod_{l \neq k} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_g + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{a+b=n-2} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g-1} \\ &\quad + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{\substack{S=X \cup Y \\ a+b=n-2 \\ g_1+g_2=g}} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \prod_{k \in X} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_{g_1} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in Y} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g_2}, \end{aligned}$$

which is the Virasoro constraints for topological gravity. Here $\tilde{\sigma}_k$ denotes the normalized gravitational descendant $(2k + 1)!! \psi^k$.

This paper is organized as follows: In Section 2, we recall the ELSV formula and the join-cut relation satisfied by Hurwitz numbers, and consequently by linear Hodge integrals. In Section 3, we develop asymptotic analysis and derive the first three relations between linear Hodge integrals. In Section 4, we show that the first nontrivial relation is precisely the Virasoro constraints in the above recursion form.

2. ELSV formula and the join-cut relation

It is well-known that the Hurwitz numbers satisfy the join-cut relation, and hence the linear Hodge integrals, via the celebrated ELSV formula [Ekedahl et al. 2001]

$$H_{g,\mu} = \frac{r!}{|\text{Aut } \mu|} \left(\prod_{i=1}^{l(\mu)} \frac{\mu_i^{\mu_i}}{\mu_i!} \right) \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,l(\mu)}} \frac{\Lambda_g^\vee(1)}{\prod_{i=1}^{l(\mu)} (1 - \mu_i \psi_i)}.$$

The corresponding expressions for linear Hodge integrals in the join-cut relation of Hurwitz numbers $H_{g,\mu}$ can be understood as coming from the boundary strata of the moduli space of curves. Precisely, let us introduce the following notation:

- Γ_r corresponding to a generic curve in $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,l(\mu)}$:

$$\Gamma_r = \frac{1}{|\text{Aut } \mu|} \prod_{i=1}^n \frac{\mu_i^{\mu_i}}{\mu_i!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \frac{\Lambda_g^\vee(1)}{\prod (1 - \mu_i \psi_i)}$$

- Γ_J^{ij} corresponding to the boundary stratum obtained by joining the i -th and j -th marked points for $1 \leq i \neq j \leq l(\mu)$:

$$\Gamma_J^{ij} = \frac{1}{|\text{Aut } \eta^{ij}|} \prod_{k=1}^{n-1} \frac{\eta_k^{ij} \eta_k^{ij}}{\eta_k^{ij}!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n-1}} \frac{\Lambda_g^\vee(1)}{\prod (1 - \eta_k^{ij} \psi_k)}, \quad \eta^{ij} \in J(\mu)$$

where $J(\mu)$ denotes the set of join partitions and η^{ij} is the one obtained by joining the i -th and j -th parts of μ .

- $\Gamma_{C_1}^i(\nu)$ corresponding to the boundary stratum obtained by pinching around the i -th marked point:

$$\Gamma_{C_1}^i(\nu) = \frac{1}{|\text{Aut } \nu|} \prod_{k=1}^{n+1} \frac{\nu_k^{\nu_k}}{\nu_k!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g-1, n+1}} \frac{\Lambda_{g-1}^\vee(1)}{\prod(1 - \nu_k \psi_k)}, \quad \nu \in C_i(\mu),$$

where $C_i(\mu)$ denotes the set of partitions obtained by cutting μ_i into two parts p and q such that $p + q = \mu_i$.

- $\Gamma_{C_2}^i(\nu_1, \nu_2)$ corresponding to the boundary stratum obtained by splitting around the i -th marked point:

$$\Gamma_{C_2}^i(\nu_1, \nu_2) = \left(\prod_{k=1}^{n+1} \frac{\nu_k^{\nu_k}}{\nu_k!} \right) \prod_{s=1,2} \frac{1}{|\text{Aut } \nu_s|} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_s, n_s}} \frac{\Lambda_{g_s}^\vee(1)}{\prod(1 - \nu_{s,k} \psi_k)}$$

where $\nu_1 \cup \nu_2 = \nu \in C_i(\mu)$ with $p \in \nu_1$ and $q \in \nu_2$.

In this notation, the join-cut relation [Goulden and Jackson 1997; 1999a; 1999b; Goulden et al. 2000; Liu et al. 2003] for linear Hodge integrals, via the ELSV formula, is written as

$$(1) \quad r\Gamma_r = \sum_{i=1}^n \left(\sum_{j \neq i} \frac{\mu_i + \mu_j}{2} \Gamma_J^{ij} + \sum_{\nu \in C_i(\mu)} \frac{p(\mu_i - p)}{2} \left(\Gamma_{C_1}^{i,p} + \sum_{\substack{g_1 + g_2 = g \\ \nu_1 \cup \nu_2 = \nu}} \Gamma_{C_2}^{i,p} \right) \right).$$

When there's no confusion, we will denote by $\eta = \eta^{ij}$ the join-partition and by $\nu = \nu^{i,p}$ the cut-partition of splitting $\mu_i = p + (\mu_i - p)$ for some $1 \leq p < \mu_i$. Note that in the Γ_{C_2} -type contribution, unstable cases are included; precisely, in the cases $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{0,1}$ and $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{0,2}$, the integrals are defined to be

$$\int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{0,1}} \frac{1}{1 - k \psi_1} = \frac{1}{k^2} \quad \text{and} \quad \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{0,2}} \frac{1}{(1 - p \psi_1)(1 - q \psi_2)} = \frac{1}{p + q}.$$

3. Asymptotic analysis

In this section, we study asymptotic behaviour of the join-cut relation (1) and obtain a system of relations between linear Hodge integrals. The expression of linear Hodge integral admits the expansion

$$(2) \quad \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \frac{\Lambda_g^\vee(1)}{\prod(1 - \mu_i \psi_i)} = \sum_k \prod \mu_i^{k_i} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod \psi_i^{k_i} + \text{lower degree terms}$$

with respect to the ramification degree, where $\tilde{k} = (k_1, \dots, k_n) \in (\mathbb{Z}_{\geq 0})^n$ are multi-indices satisfying the constraint $\sum k_i = 3g - 3 + n$. Hence the top-degree terms

consist of Hodge integrals of ψ -classes only and lower degree terms involve λ -classes. This will give a system of relations between linear Hodge integrals. More precisely, any linear Hodge integral is determined recursively in terms of either lower-dimensional or lower-degree λ -class integrals. The following asymptotic formula is crucial in asymptotic analysis.

Proposition 3.1. *As $n \rightarrow \infty$, we have for $k, l \geq 0$,*

$$e^{-n} \sum_{p+q=n} \frac{p^{p+k+1} q^{q+l+1}}{p!q!} \rightarrow \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{(2k+1)!!(2l+1)!!}{2^{k+l+2}(k+l+2)!} \right) n^{k+l+2} + o(n^{k+l+2}),$$

$$e^{-n} \sum_{p+q=n} \frac{p^{p+k+1} q^{q-1}}{p!q!} \rightarrow \frac{n^{k+1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} - \left(\frac{(2k+1)!!}{2^{k+1}k!} \right) n^k + o(n^k).$$

Proof. Let $m \in \mathbb{N}$ be such that $1 < m < n$ and consider three ranges of p, q :

$$R_l = \{(p, q) \mid p > n - m \text{ and } q < m\},$$

$$R_c = \{(p, q) \mid m \leq p, q \leq n - m\},$$

$$R_r = \{(p, q) \mid p < m \text{ and } q > n - m\}.$$

Recall Stirling’s formula:

$$n! = \frac{\sqrt{2\pi} n^{n+1/2}}{e^n} \left(1 + \frac{1}{12n} + \dots \right)$$

For the summation over R_c , let $m = n\epsilon$ and $p = nx$ for some $\epsilon, x \in \mathbb{R}_{>0}$ so that $m, p \in \mathbb{N}$, then we have

$$e^{-n} \sum_{p=m}^{n-m} \frac{p^{p+k+1}}{p!} \frac{q^{q+l+1}}{q!} = \sum_{p=m}^{n-m} \frac{1}{2\pi} p^{k+1/2} q^{l+1/2} (1 + o(1))$$

$$\rightarrow \frac{n^{k+l+2}}{2\pi} \int_{\epsilon}^{1-\epsilon} x^{k+1/2} (1-x)^{l+1/2} dx + o(n^{k+l+2}) \quad \text{as } n \text{ goes to } \infty$$

$$= \frac{n^{k+l+2}}{2\pi} \frac{(2k+1)!!(2l+1)!!}{(2(k+l)+3)!!} \int_{\epsilon}^{1-\epsilon} \frac{(1-x)^{k+l+3/2}}{\sqrt{x}} dx + o(n^{k+l+2}) + O(\sqrt{\epsilon})$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{(2k+1)!!(2l+1)!!}{2^{k+l+2}(k+l+2)!} \right) n^{k+l+2} + o(n^{k+l+2}) + O(\sqrt{\epsilon}).$$

As $n \rightarrow \infty$, we can send $\epsilon \rightarrow 0$. For the summation over R_l and R_r , the top-degree terms belong to $O(n^{k+1/2})$ and $O(n^{l+1/2})$, respectively. Since we assume $k, l \geq 0$, both cases belong to $o(n^{k+l+2})$, and this proves the first formula. For the second formula, R_l has highest order of $n^{k+1/2}$ and one can show that the leading term in the asymptotic behaviour is $n^{k+1/2}/\sqrt{2\pi}$. After integration by parts, R_c

gives the second highest term in the asymptotic behaviour

$$\begin{aligned}
 e^{-n} \sum_{p=m}^{n-1} \frac{p^{p+k+1}}{p!} \frac{q^{q-1}}{q!} &= \sum_{p=m}^{n-1} \frac{1}{2\pi} p^{k+1/2} q^{l-3/2} (1 + o(1)) \\
 &\longrightarrow \frac{n^k}{2\pi} \int_{\epsilon}^1 x^{k+1/2} (1-x)^{-3/2} dx + o(n^k) \text{ as } n \text{ tends to } \infty \\
 &= \frac{n^{k+1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} - \frac{n^k}{2\pi} (2k+1) \int_{\epsilon}^{\delta} \frac{x^{k-1/2}}{\sqrt{1-x}} dx + o(n^k) \\
 &= \frac{n^{k+1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} - \left(\frac{(2k+1)!!}{2^{k+1}k!} \right) n^k + o(n^k) + O(\sqrt{\epsilon}).
 \end{aligned}$$

This proves the second formula. □

Let $\mu_i = Nx_i$ for some $x_i \in \mathbb{R}$ and $N \in \mathbb{N}$. By taking general values of x_i , we can assume, without loss of generality, that $|\text{Aut } \mu| = 1$. As the ramification degree tends to infinity, that is, as $N \rightarrow \infty$, the Hodge integral expansion (2) tends to

$$\begin{aligned}
 \prod_{i=1}^n \frac{\mu_i^{\mu_i+k_i}}{\mu_i!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod \psi_i^{k_i} + O(e^N N^{m-1}) \\
 \longrightarrow e^{|\mu|} \prod_{i=1}^n \frac{\mu_i^{k_i-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod \psi_i^{k_i} + O(e^N N^{m-1})
 \end{aligned}$$

where $m = 3g - 3 + n - (n/2)$ is the highest degree of N in (2). Same expansion applies to each term in (1). By taking out the common factor $e^{|\mu|}$ and applying the asymptotic formula in Proposition 3.1, we find that

$$\begin{aligned}
 r\Gamma_r &= N^{m+1} \left((x_1 + \dots + x_n) \prod_{i=1}^n \frac{x_i^{k_i-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod_{i=1}^n \psi_i^{k_i} \right) + O(N^m), \\
 \Gamma_{C_1}^i &= O(N^m) + \frac{N^{m+1/2}}{2} \sum_{k+l=k_i-2} \frac{(2k+1)!!(2l+1)!!}{2^{k+l+2}(k+l+2)!} x_i^{k+l+2} \prod_{j \neq i} \frac{x_j^{k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \times \\
 &\quad \left(\int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g-1,n+1}} \psi_1^k \psi_2^l \prod_{j \neq i} \psi_j^{k_j} + \sum_{\substack{g_1+g_2=g \\ v_1 \cup v_2=v}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_1,n_1}} \psi_1^k \prod_{j \neq i} \psi_j^{k_j} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_2,n_2}} \psi_1^l \prod_{j \neq i} \psi_j^{k_j} \right), \\
 \Gamma_{C_2}^i &= N^{m+1/2} \prod_{j \neq i} \frac{x_j^{k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \left(\sqrt{N} \frac{x_i^{k_i+1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod_{l=1}^n \psi_l^{k_l} \right. \\
 &\quad \left. - \frac{(2k_i+1)!!}{2^{k_i+1}k_i!} x_i^{k_i} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod_{l=1}^n \psi_l^{k_l} \right) + O(N^m),
 \end{aligned}$$

$$\Gamma_J^{ij} = N^{m+1/2} \frac{(x_i + x_j)^{k_i+k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \prod_{l \neq i, j} \frac{x_l^{k_l-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g, n-1}} \psi^{k_i+k_j-1} \prod_{l \neq i, j} \psi_l^{k_l} + O(N^m).$$

Putting them together in the join-cut relation (1) yields a system of relations between linear Hodge integrals as follows: First, we have a system of relations given by the spectrum of N -degree. Secondly, each relation given by some fixed N -degree stratum can be viewed as a polynomial in the x_i 's

$$R_{\tilde{m}}(x_1, \dots, x_n) = \sum_{(s_1, \dots, s_n)} C(s_1, \dots, s_n) x_1^{s_1} \cdots x_n^{s_n}$$

where \tilde{m} is a half integer less than or equal to $m + 1$ and the coefficient $C(s_i)$ of the homogeneous polynomial $x_1^{s_1} \cdots x_n^{s_n}$ involves linear Hodge integrals. Since the x_i 's are independent variables, we obtain vanishing relations for each of $C(s_i)$'s. In particular, the first few vanishing relations are given as follows:

- For the N^{m+1} -stratum, we have a trivial identity

$$(x_1 + \cdots + x_n) \prod \frac{x_i^{k_i-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g, n}} \prod \psi_i^{k_i} - (x_1 + \cdots + x_n) \prod \frac{x_i^{k_i-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g, n}} \prod \psi_i^{k_i} = 0.$$

- For the $N^{m+1/2}$ -stratum, we have the relation

$$(3) \quad \sum_{i=1}^n \left(\frac{(2k_i + 1)!!}{2^{k_i+1} k_i!} x_i^{k_i} \prod_{j \neq i} \frac{x_j^{k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g, n}} \prod \psi_j^{k_j} - \sum_{j \neq i} \frac{(x_i + x_j)^{k_i+k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \prod_{l \neq i, j} \frac{x_l^{k_l-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g, n-1}} \psi^{k_i+k_j-1} \prod \psi_l^{k_l} - \frac{1}{2} \sum_{k+l=k_i-2} \frac{(2k + 1)!!(2l + 1)!!}{2^{k+l+2} (k + l + 2)!} x_i^{k_i} \prod_{j \neq i} \frac{x_j^{k_j-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \left(\int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g-1, n+1}} \psi_1^k \psi_2^l \prod \psi_j^{k_j} + \sum_{\substack{g_1+g_2=g \\ v_1 \cup v_2=v}} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g_1, n_1}} \psi_1^k \prod \psi_j^{k_j} \int_{\bar{\mathcal{M}}_{g_2, n_2}} \psi_1^l \prod \psi_j^{k_j} \right) \right) = 0.$$

- Lower degree strata will give relations for Hodge integrals involving nontrivial λ -classes in terms of lower-dimensional ones. For example, the relation given by the N^m -stratum verifies the expression of λ_1 -class

$$12\lambda_1 = \kappa_1 + \delta - \sum_{i=1}^n \psi_i$$

where $\delta = \overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,\ell} \setminus \mathcal{M}_{g,\ell}$ is the boundary divisor and $\kappa_1 = \pi_*(\psi^2)$ as the Gysin image of forgetting map $\pi_1 : \overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,\ell+1} \rightarrow \overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,\ell}$.

4. DVV-formula through the asymptotic analysis

Witten’s celebrated conjecture [1991] asserts that the tautological intersections on $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}$ are governed by the KdV hierarchy. M. Kontsevich gave the first proof [1992] by constructing proper combinatorial model for the intersection theory of $\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}$. A. Okounkov and R. Pandharipande [2001] and M. Mirzakhani [2007a; 2007b] (see also [Mulase and Safnuk 2006]) gave different approaches through the enumeration of branched coverings of \mathbb{P}^1 and the Weil–Petersson volume, respectively. More recently, M. Kazarian and S. Lando [2005] obtained an algebro-geometric proof starting from the ELSV formula [Ekedahl et al. 2001]. In this section, we show that the Virasoro constraints is encoded in the join-cut relation of the Hurwitz numbers as the first nontrivial relation among the system of relations obtained via the asymptotic analysis. Precisely we derive the recursion relation for the correlation functions of topological gravity [Dijkgraaf 1992]

$$(4) \quad \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_n \prod_{k \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_g = \sum_{k \in S} (2k + 1) \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_{n+k-1} \prod_{l \neq k} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_g + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{a+b=n-2} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g-1} + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{\substack{a+b=n-2 \\ S=X \cup Y \\ g_1+g_2=g}} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \prod_{k \in X} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_{g_1} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in Y} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g_2}.$$

This recursion relation consists of the Virasoro constraints written as relations for coefficients of the partition function. This recursion relation was first obtained by R. Dijkgraaf, E. Verlinde and H. Verlinde through a physical argument. In this paper, we will call formula (4) the *DVV-formula*. We note that similar asymptotic behaviour of Hurwitz numbers has been studied before, for example by A. Okounkov and R. Pandharipande [2001] and D. Zvonkine [2005]. They obtained the intersection numbers $\langle \tau_{d_1} \cdots \tau_{d_p} \rangle_g$ using asymptotics of Hurwitz numbers. In particular, A. Okounkov and R. Pandharipande [2001] showed that the Laplace transform of certain asymptotics of Hurwitz numbers is equal to Kontsevich’s generating series for ψ integrals:

$$LH_g(y_1, \dots, y_l) = \sum_{\sum k_i=3g-3+l} \langle \tau_{k_1} \cdots \tau_{k_l} \rangle_g \prod_{i=1}^l \frac{(2k_i - 1)!!}{s_i^{2k_i+1}}, \quad s_i = \sqrt{2y_i}.$$

The system of relations between linear Hodge integrals that we develop in this paper can be considered as full spectrum of asymptotic relations encoded in the

join-cut relation of Hurwitz numbers while the works of Okounkov–Pandharipande and Zvonkine concern the top-degree relation.

Now we will show that the first nontrivial relation (3) is the DVV-formula.

Theorem 1. *The relation (3) is the DVV-formula (4).*

Proof. Introduce formal variables $s_i \in \mathbb{R}_{>0}$ and recall the Laplace transformations

$$\int_0^\infty \frac{x^{k-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} e^{-x/2s} dx = (2k-1)!! s^{k+1/2}, \quad \int_0^\infty x^k e^{-x/2s} dx = k! (2s)^{k+1}.$$

We have vanishing relations for coefficients of each monomial in (3). In particular, the term involving the monomial $x_1^{k_1} \prod_{i=2}^n x_i^{k_i-1/2}$ is given by

$$\begin{aligned} 0 &= \left(\frac{x_1^{k_1}}{2^{k_1+1} k_1!} \prod_{i=2}^n \frac{x_i^{k_i-1/2}}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \right) \\ &\quad \times \left((2k_1+1)!! \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod_{i=1}^n \psi_i^{k_i} - \sum_{j \neq i} \frac{(2k_1+2k_j-1)!!}{(2k_j-1)!!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n-1}} \psi^{k_i+k_j-1} \prod \psi_l^{k_l} \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \frac{1}{2} \sum_{k+l=k_1-2} (2k+1)!!(2l+1)!! \left(\int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g-1,n+1}} \psi^k \psi^l \prod_{j=2}^n \psi_j^{k_j} \right. \right. \\ &\quad \left. \left. + \sum_{\substack{g_1+g_2=g \\ I \cup J = \{2, \dots, n\}}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_1,1+|I|}} \psi^k \prod_{i \in I} \psi_i^{k_i} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_2,1+|J|}} \psi^l \prod_{j \in J} \psi_j^{k_j} \right) \right). \end{aligned}$$

The extra $\frac{1}{2}$ factor for the cut cases are due to different graph counting conventions. The coefficient of the join case can be obtained by k_1 -fold differentiation of $(x_1 + x_j)^{k_1+k_j-1/2}$ with respect to x_1 followed by evaluation at $x_1 = 0$. It can also be computed directly using the Laplace transformation: Applying the Laplace transformation to the above vanishing relation yields

$$\begin{aligned} 0 &= \left(\prod_{j=2}^n (2k_j-1)!! \right) \\ &\quad \times \left((2k_1+1)!! \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n}} \prod_{i=1}^n \psi_i^{k_i} - \sum_{j \neq i} \frac{(2k_1+2k_j-1)!!}{(2k_j-1)!!} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g,n-1}} \psi^{k_i+k_j-1} \prod \psi_l^{k_l} \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \frac{1}{2} \sum_{k+l=k_1-2} (2k+1)!!(2l+1)!! \left(\int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g-1,n+1}} \psi^k \psi^l \prod_{j=2}^n \psi_j^{k_j} \right. \right. \\ &\quad \left. \left. + \sum_{\substack{g_1+g_2=g \\ I \cup J = \{2, \dots, n\}}} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_1,1+|I|}} \psi^k \prod_{i \in I} \psi_i^{k_i} \int_{\overline{\mathcal{M}}_{g_2,1+|J|}} \psi^l \prod_{j \in J} \psi_j^{k_j} \right) \right). \end{aligned}$$

Multiplying the above formula by a common factor $\prod_{j \neq 1} (2k_l + 1)$ and changing to the notation of DVV-formula given by $\tilde{\sigma}_k = (2k + 1)!! \psi^k$ yields the relation

$$\begin{aligned} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_n \prod_{k \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_g &= \sum_{k \in S} (2k + 1) \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_{n+k-1} \prod_{l \neq k} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_g + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{a+b=n-2} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in S} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g-1} \\ &\quad + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{\substack{a+b=n-2 \\ S=X \cup Y, g_1+g_2=g}} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_a \prod_{k \in X} \tilde{\sigma}_k \right\rangle_{g_1} \left\langle \tilde{\sigma}_b \prod_{l \in Y} \tilde{\sigma}_l \right\rangle_{g_2} \end{aligned}$$

which is the DVV-formula (4). The factor $2k + 1$ comes from the missing j -th marked point in the join-graph contribution. \square

The DVV-formula (4) constitutes the Virasoro constraints for the point target [Dijkgraaf 1992], and hence gives another proof of Witten’s Conjecture (Kontsevich’s Theorem).

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
